Most of the attendees at Hope Vision Fellowship are not Adventists. And they come because they feel safe there. This church goes beyond meeting the spiritual needs of the blind community. It also helps them meet some of their physical needs. Pat, one of the founding members, says that most of the church's members can't afford some of the basic necessities of life. "Some rely on food banks, but they can't always get there," she says, while she prepares food bags for members to take home.
