

WHICH OFFERINGS CAUSE MORE IMPACT?

sc. 0	Marcos heard a preacher saying that offerings given and distributed according to Biblical principles produce a broader impact and more equitable growth on the mission work.	
SC. 0	Intrigued, he asked for clarification, and the pastor told him that three of those principles are:	
sc. 0	1. (First) Regularity (Proverbs 3:9; Malachi 3:8-10). The frequency should be determined by God's blessings, not the church's needs or even our goodwill. This means that every time we receive an income, which is a blessing from the Lord, we should honor Him with both our tithes and offerings.	
sc. 0	2. (The second principle is) Proportionality (Deuteronomy 16:17; 1 Corinthians 16:2). A proportional offering means that the offering amount is adjusted as the income is modified. Many choose a fixed proportion or percentage of their income or increase to give to the Lord as an offering.	
sc. C	3. (And the third principle is) A "Glocal" Mindset (Acts 1:8). "Glocal" stands for "global" and "local" at the same	
	time. Our missionary effort and, consequently, our offerings should carry the plan of salvation to the area where we live and also to all the whole world. The Adventist Church devised an offering distribution plan called the Combined Offering Plan to make this distribution more equitable.	

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According to what is suggested by the Combined Offering Plan, 50%-60% of your total offering should support your local church's mission (sponsored by the church's budget); 20%-30% will support the regional mission (usually sponsored by the Conference/Union/Division); and 20% should support the international mission, which the General Conference supervises through the World Mission Fund.

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Then the pastor told Marcos that where the Combined Offering Plan is practiced (roughly covering 90% of the world Adventist population), every unassigned offering is automatically distributed that way. This distribution plan provides equitable growth to local, regional, and international missionary projects, ministries, and initiatives.

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But in regions where this plan has not yet been adopted, those willing to produce a "Glocal" impact must manually distribute their "Promise" offerings using similar proportions—according to Acts 1:8, simultaneously covering local, regional, and international needs.

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Marcos decided to become a "Glocal" missionary agent through his offering. You are also invited to join him in advancing Jesus' commission to be His witness simultaneously "in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8), which means, locally, regionally, and internationally.

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As we return our tithe and the Promise offerings, let us put our desires last and God first.
